
# **Primary Industries**

Proportion of GDP productivity across the Vocational Pathways measured by GDP from labour (per person) for 2015





- developing new food and fibre products to meet changing consumer preferences
- managing animal productivity and welfare
- maintaining and improving NZ's sophisticated bio-security system
- maintaining and assisting in laying agricultural/ horticultural drains
- demonstrating knowledge of income, taxation, and other deductions for personal financial management
- managing plant productivity and pest resistance
- demonstrating knowledge of principles of quality systems in the wood manufacturing industries
- performing general servicing checks on a motor vehicle
- researching genetics for plant and herd improvement
- demonstrating understanding of advanced plant propagation techniques used for commercial production in New Zealand
- demonstrating knowledge of farm dairy design and the effluent system
- demonstrating knowledge of soil management practices.

#### What work is available?

There is a wide range of jobs in this environmentally friendly sector that include:

Caring for and rearing animals, fruit and vegetable production, scanning pregnant animals, seed technologist, landscaper, growing and selling flowers, maintaining parks and cemeteries, turf laying and maintenance.

Planting, looking after or measuring trees, sawmill, kiln, or treatment operator, yard supervisor, saw doctor, energy centre operator, paper maker or pulp mill operator, machinist, warehouse person, machines and equipment operator or servicer, wood panels manufacturer.

Project or research engineer, operations or site manager, consultant/adviser, processing food or seafood, dairy farming, monitoring factory environments, supervising factory operations, managing a team, supply chain logistics, transport, heavy vehicle driver.

Export and storage, providing policy advice to government, research worker or scientist, supply chain analyst.

Aquaculture diver, marine farm worker, deckhand, vessel manager, marine engineer, seafood retailer or wholesaler, hydrological data analyst.
